Turning Over a New Leaf

Since 1994, gasoline powered leaf blowers have been prohibited throughout the City of Hidden Hills. This prohibition was put in place as the use of gas-powered leaf blowers raise concerns about excessive noise, air pollution, and exposure to particulate matter. No gas leaf blowers are allowed to be used in the City, anywhere.


Non-gasoline powered (electric or battery powered) leaf blowers are permitted – but only on private property – for example, in residential front yards and backyards. Leaf blowers are not allowed to be used on parkways, roadways, streets, or pedestrian or equestrian trails.

The City thanks all residents who have worked to help implement these rules. If you see a gas leaf blower or improper use of an electric or battery-powered leaf blower, you can report the violation to City Hall by calling 818-888-9281 or by emailing staff@hiddenhillscity.org. Navigating a Longer Wetter Rainy Season

Not in two decades has Hidden Hills seen the deluge of rain that impacted the City and all of Southern California in early February. It's important to be mindful that the rainy season is still in full swing until Spring. During this period, heavy rains and high winds are expected, and all residents need to be prepared for these weather conditions.

Winds have the potential to cause damage by toppling various items and dispersing debris that was not properly disposed of. This debris may find its way into storm drains and local waterways. The accumulation of litter and debris in drains, coupled with increased rainfall, raises the concern of potential flooding and transport of pollutants. Trash can also reach our waterways without passing through the storm drain system. Wind can lift debris and transport it to our local lakes and creeks. Despite these challenges, there are several proactive measures we can take to safeguard our waterways.

Let's work together to ensure the safety and resilience of our community during this rainy season.

Take Action!

- Check your local weather regularly for adverse weather conditions such as strong wind and rain.
- Secure your trash bins to prevent them from falling over with wind.
- Ensure your trash bins are closed or covered at all times.
- Maintain and clean roof gutters and outdoor irrigation drainage pipes to ensure rainwater properly flows to street drains and doesn't flood your yard.
- Sweep dirt out of curbs and into landscaping to prevent it from entering storm drains.
- Do not apply fertilizers before a rain event or within 5 feet of pavement
- 25 feet of a storm drain
- 50 feet of a water body
- Always pick up after your pet.

Available Tax Relief for Natural Disasters

This has been a challenging few months when it comes to our weather. The rain totals have been historic with meteorologists indicating the most recent storm was the third wettest over a two-day period since 1877.

In the event of any damage to your home resulting from the recent storms or other natural disaster, there is property tax relief available.

By filing a claim for Misfortune & Calamity relief within one year of the incident, properties that have sustained a minimum of \$10,000 in damage may be eligible for a refund of taxes already paid and lower annual tax bills until the property is repaired or rebuilt.

The M&C claim forms - known as the Application for Reassessment: Property Damaged or Destroyed by Misfortune or Calamity - can be obtained online at: <https://assessor.lacounty.gov/tax-relief/disaster-relief> or by phone at (213) 974-8658.

Take Action!



COVER AND SECURE TRASH BINS

Secure trash bin lids to prevent debris from entering our waterways. Trash can degrade habitats, harm wildlife and potentially endanger people's health.



INSPECT YOUR LAWN AND OUTDOOR AREAS

Properly dispose of any debris or trash seen around your property. Wind can cause loose debris and trash to end up in waterways, degrading the quality of our water supply.



PROPERLY MANAGE GREEN WASTE

Ensure grass clippings and leaves are disposed of in a green waste bin. They can release Nitrogen and Phosphorus which adversely impact water quality.



PICK UP AFTER YOUR PET

During rainfall, pet waste left on lawns washes into storm drains. It contains pathogens (bacteria, parasites and viruses), harming the environment and human health.

City Council UPDATES

At the Council meeting on February 12th, the Council heard a legislative update presentation by Dane Hutchings, the Managing Director of Renne Public Policy Group, who informed the Council on a slate of bills being proposed in Sacramento to be mindful of. The Council then approved the appointment of Michael Jenkins, of Best,

Save on Your L.A. County Property Tax Bill Every Year

Homeowners' Exemption Available

If you own a home and it is your principal place of residence as of January 1, you may apply for an exemption of \$7,000 from your assessed value.

The Los Angeles County Assessor, who is responsible for discovering all taxable property in Los Angeles County, except for state-assessed property, is committed to helping every qualified homeowner in LA County in receiving a Homeowners' Exemption (HOX) tax savings.

The HOX is the easiest and most accessible program to apply for that reduces the assessed value of a home by \$7,000 for tax purposes,

provided that the property is the owner's principal place of residence as of January 1st. This translates to a reduction of \$70 annually to a homeowners' property tax bill.

County records indicate that 40% percent of eligible homeowners in the City of Hidden Hills do not take advantage of the HOX tax savings. All you need to do to receive the tax break is fill out the application at: www.assessor.lacounty.gov/exemptions/homeowner-exemption.

The deadline was February 15th and if you missed the deadline you should still file your claim as you will have your savings prorated for this tax year and receive the full benefit in future years. The savings will continue until a change (such as a sale) is recorded.
