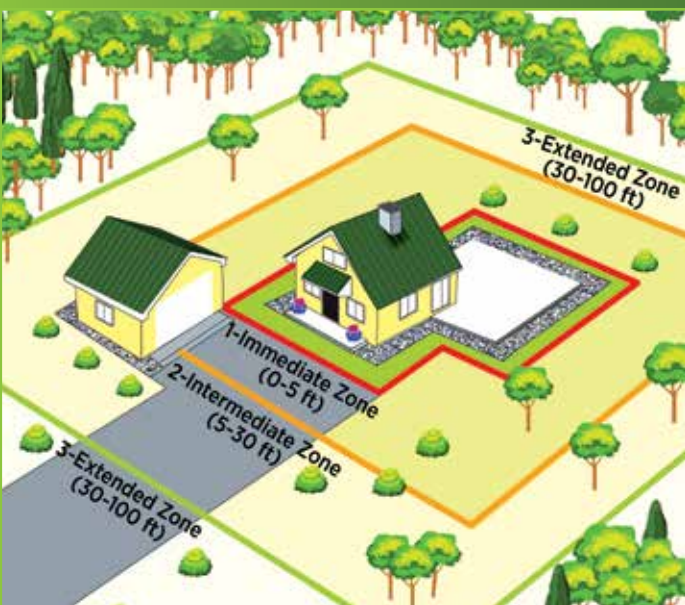
Staying Prepared in Challenging Times

Home Ignition Zone Assessments



In December's newsletter, we highlighted a free, invaluable service available to Hidden Hills residents that's worth mentioning again considering the recent fires: Home Ignition Zone assessments provided by the Los Angeles Emergency Preparedness Foundation (LAEPF), a privately funded organization supporting Los Angeles County with disaster preparedness and wildfire risk mitigation.

LAEPF mitigation specialists will visit your property, evaluate wildfire risks, and provide a detailed assessment report with specific recommendations to reduce exposures and protect your home. These assessments empower homeowners with proven strategies to mitigate vulnerabilities and help prevent structure loss during a wildfire.

This exclusive resource is only available to a select few communities in Los Angeles County. Don't miss this opportunity to enhance your home's safety and resilience.

Know Your Zone

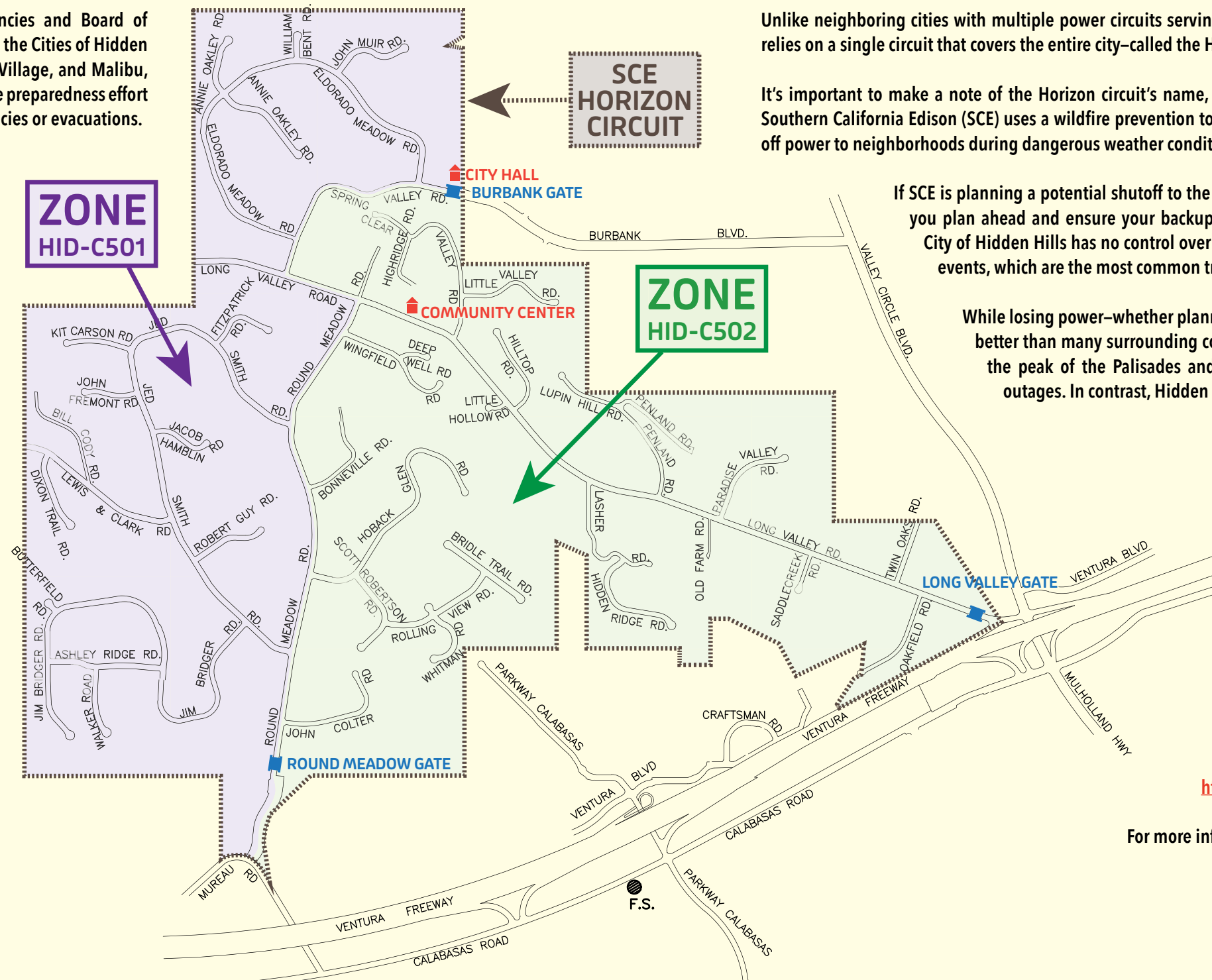
Los Angeles County public safety agencies and Board of Supervisors 3rd District office, along with the Cities of Hidden Hills, Calabasas, Agoura Hills, Westlake Village, and Malibu, follow the "Know Your Zone" collaborative preparedness effort that aims to equip residents for emergencies or evacuations.

During a large-scale incident that requires evacuations, first responders will refer to the genasys Protect platform for planning and conducting evacuations. LA County Fire, with LA County Sheriff, has divided the City of Hidden Hills into two zones. Hidden Hills residents are either in zone HID-C501 or HID-C502, with Round Meadow Road being the primary intersection of the two zones.

During emergencies the Zone map will be updated in real time, so residents will have access to information about emergency services in their zone, see real-time zone status updates, shelter options, and more.

Knowing your zone is an important part of your emergency plan. Residents are encouraged to search their address and see their zone, by visiting: www.protect.genasys.com. Read more about genasys Connect on page 5.

Know Your Circuit

Unlike neighboring cities with multiple power circuits serving their communities, Hidden Hills relies on a single circuit that covers the entire city—called the Horizon circuit.

It's important to make a note of the Horizon circuit's name, as it becomes particularly relevant during extreme weather events. Southern California Edison (SCE) uses a wildfire prevention tool called Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS), which temporarily cuts off power to neighborhoods during dangerous weather conditions to reduce the risk of electrical equipment sparking a wildfire.

If SCE is planning a potential shutoff to the Horizon circuit, the City will issue a citywide emergency alert to help you plan ahead and ensure your backup supplies are ready. However, it's important to understand that the City of Hidden Hills has no control over SCE's decisions to de-energize circuits during high winds or Red Flag events, which are the most common triggers for PSPS events.

While losing power—whether planned or unplanned—is undeniably inconvenient, Hidden Hills has fared better than many surrounding communities during recent wildfire emergencies. For example, during the peak of the Palisades and Kenneth Fires, nearby areas experienced frequent and prolonged outages. In contrast, Hidden Hills was only affected by a single PSPS event on the Horizon circuit.

This relative resilience can be credited to the city's proactive investments in utility infrastructure. Efforts such as undergrounding utility poles and the ongoing installation of covered wire protectors have significantly strengthened the city's power grid. These upgrades play a key role in SCE field crews' decisions about which circuits to de-energize, helping ensure the Horizon circuit remains operational during emergencies. Thanks to these measures, Hidden Hills has been able to keep the lights on and maintain power during critical situations.

Sign Up for EMERGENCY NOTIFICATIONS

During the height of the Palisades and Kenneth Fires, and a series of Red Flag Warnings, Hidden Hills faced a wave of critical challenges. The city sent out numerous emergency notification alerts, keeping residents informed and prepared amidst the uncertainty. From updates on Public Safety Power Shutoffs (PSPS) to an urgent Mandatory Evacuation when the Kenneth Fire started in Upper Las Virgenes Canyon Open Space Preserve (Ahmanson Ranch), these alerts were a lifeline for the community, ensuring safety and swift action during a time of heightened risk.

If you haven't already, we strongly urge all residents to sign up for the city's emergency notifications delivered through the Blackboard Connect Notification System, should we need to quickly send out real-time critical alerts.

Why is this important?
This service enables the city to reach you in real time via email, phone, and text with important to urgent situations such as fires, floods, evacuations, potential power shutoffs, or critical Sheriff activity. With many in our community using a variety of home and mobile communication devices, signing up for all three emergency notification methods will enable you to choose the best way for the city to reach you and your family members.

Must Have APPS

In an era of increasing wildfire threats and extreme weather events, staying informed is not just a precaution—it's a necessity. Two essential free apps that every Hidden Hills resident should have on their mobile devices are Watch Duty and genasys Connect. These apps are designed to keep you connected, informed, and ready to act during emergencies, making them indispensable for ensuring your safety and that of your loved ones.

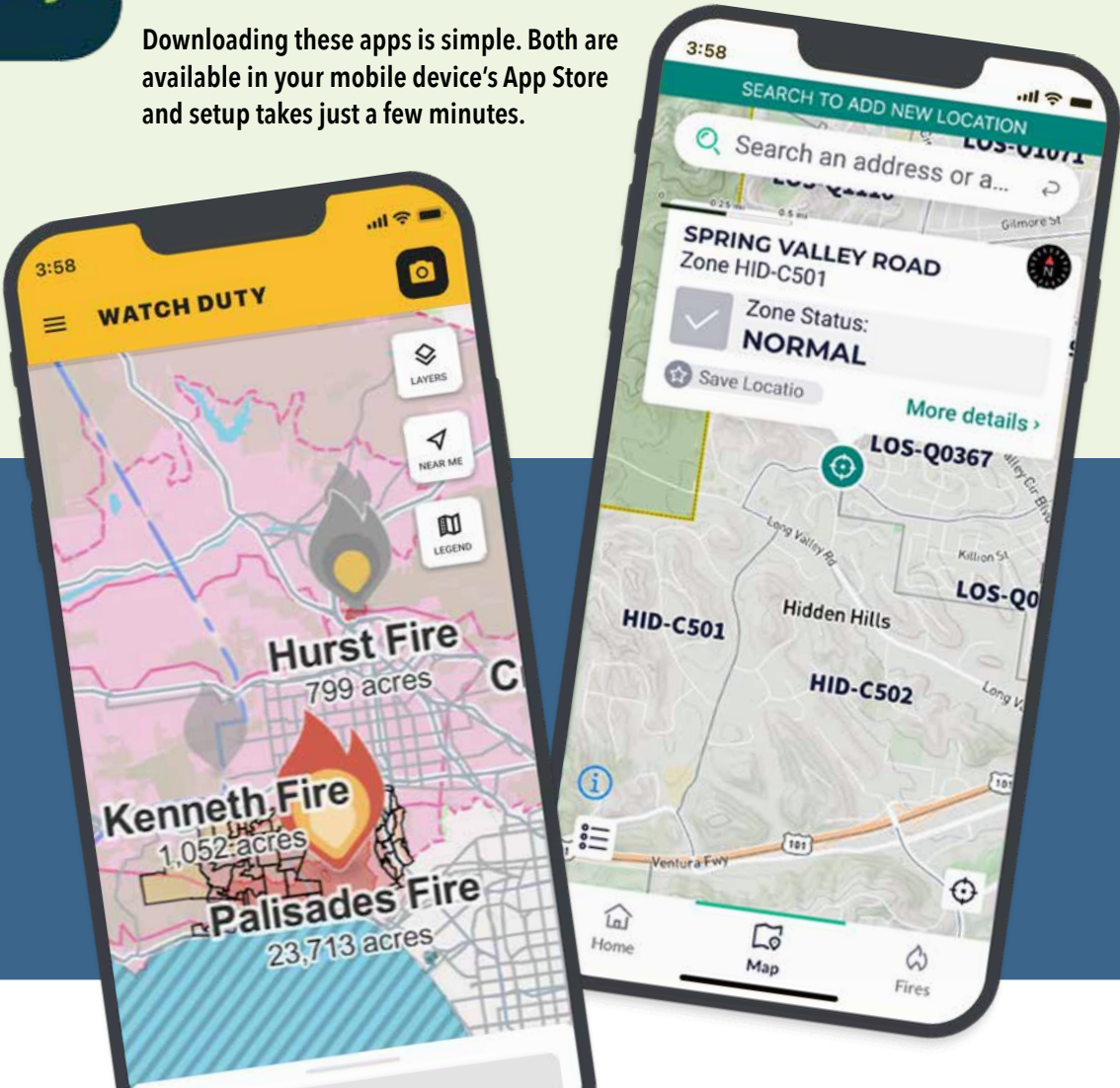


Watch Duty is a community-focused app that provides real-time wildfire information from verified sources such as active and retired firefighters, first responders, and fire monitors. It delivers critical updates on active wildfires, including location, size, movement, and containment efforts, all presented on an easy-to-read map. The app was created to help first responders protect communities and became an indispensable tool to many Southern Californian's safety and awareness during the wildfires.



genasys Connect is a public safety app that provides location-based alerts and emergency notifications directly from city and government agencies designed to provide hyper-localized information tailored to your location. During a large-scale incident that requires evacuations, first responders will refer to the genasys Protect platform for planning and conducting evacuations by regional zones. Hidden Hills is divided into two zones, HID-C501 and HID-C502, with Round Meadow Road being the primary intersection of the two zones.

Downloading these apps is simple. Both are available in your mobile device's App Store and setup takes just a few minutes.



City Council Updates

At the Council's Emergency Meeting on January 8th, 2025, the city declared a Proclamation of the Existence of a Local Emergency empowering the City Manager, acting as the Director of Emergency Services to command all necessary resources to effectively protect life, public safety and infrastructure during the Palisades Fire emergency. The proclamation was ratified and extended by

Resolution No. 1038 at the Special City Council Meeting held on January 15th.

The next City Council meeting will be held on Monday, March 10th. The meeting starts at 5:30 p.m. and can be watched on Channel 3 (Charter/Spectrum Cable) or web streamed via the City's website.

The Essential Role of Brush-Clearing Goats

The value of hiring of goats to perform the City's annual brush-clearing efforts became strikingly clear as the Kenneth Fire and the spot fires it ignited approached within 250 yards of Hidden Hills' perimeter and proved to be a critical line of defense as the Santa Ana winds casted embers in Upper Las Virgenes Canyon Open Space Preserve (Ahmanson Ranch).

Each year, the Mountains Recreation & Conservation Authority (MRCA) and the Mountain View Estates Homeowners Association perform a required 100-foot brush clearance around the City's northern and

western perimeters. Since 2019, the City has secured approval from both agencies to use goats for additional brush clearance and extend the cleared area by another 100 feet. This expansion effectively removes excess vegetation, further reducing the fire risk to Hidden Hills by eliminating the fuel source.

The approximately 275 ravenous goats managed to clear about 33 acres of vegetation in just two weeks and it makes all the difference when fires erupt. The Kenneth Fire served as a stark reminder of just how important these proactive measures are.
